Record Book Instructions:

DON'T CHANGE THE PAPER:

Completed record books must be on standard letter sized (8.5"x11") white paper. There are classes in still exhibits for scrapbooks so please leave these types of books there. Minor embellishments are allowed and neatness is encouraged. Books must be fastened with a staple in the upper right hand corner or secured inside a 3 ring binder or folder.

CHOOSE THE RIGHT PATH:

There will be two possible tracks for this record book. If you are exhibiting a market animal (even if you are also exhibiting a breeding stock goat project) you MUST complete the market track. On the bottom of each page will be "Breeding Stock" graphic (green hoof) and "Market" graphic (orange hoof) of the pages on your track. If the graphic is not printed on the page do not complete the page. Examples below.





DON'T BE LATE... KNOW THE DUE DATE:

The date and time to turn-in a completed record book will be listed on the Schedule of Events for Exhibitors printed in the front of the annual Fair Book.

USE THE RIGHT RESOURCES:

Good resources to help complete this record book is the publication "Goat Resource Handbook" (OSU Extension 4H135R) is available for checkout at the MSU Extension Office. Some answers will be found at gcffy.org and inside the fair book general and species rules.

YOU CAN ONLY ENTER ONE BOOK:

Even though there is a Breeding Stock Track if you are exhibiting both market and breeding stock then you *MUST* only do the market track. Anyone who turns-in more than one record book for the goat record book class will only have their market record book judged.

A completed record book should have photos of your animal. At minimum this book should have a beginning, a picture of your goat playing on something you have for your goat and ending picture. Photo captions are encouraged. Up to two extra pages can be included behind this page within this record book.







All about my goat project...

You may choose to do the weight record *OR* the essay. You may not do both the weight record and the essay for this record book. The points scored for whichever choice you make will be the same. The fair recommends all market exhibitors weigh their animals frequently but understands that access to a scale is not always available.

Choice 1 - Weight Record:

Do not complete the essay "Choice 2" below if you complete this section.

It is recommended to weigh your market goat animal(s) at least once each month. Use one chart for up to four animals. These should be the same (up to) four market goat animals registered on the market goat registration form. If you are doing a breeding program this can be a goat being raised.

Choice 2 - Project Essay:

Do not complete the weight record "Choice 1" above if you complete this section.

Write and attach to your completed book an essay from one of these two essay topic choices. Junior exhibitors complete an up to half page essay. Intermediate Exhibitors complete an up to one page essay. Senior Exhibitors complete an up to 2 page essay. Topic 1: Describe what judges look for in the show ring of the fair. Discuss steps you can take to present your animal in the best possible way to a judge. Topic 2: Discuss what is involved to produce milk from goats and what the milk can be used to make. Essays have the same possible points as the above weight section.

A good source to find the current market price is the USDA Alabama Weekly Goat Auction Summary. If using this report use the Slaughter Goats AVERAGE price for bucks/billies at the weight closest to your expected finish weight. Prices on this re-
port will be calculated by the animal and NOT by the pound (or 100 lbs.).




